His Chardonnay "Parison", "Golden Delicious" Riesling, "Copper Lily" Sauvignon Blanc and the 2008 and 2009 "The Wild Sky" Cabernet Sauvignon were on offer and incredibly well received. If the name sounds familiar it's because Zero One Vintners' Merlot-based wine, "Sauce", is what we have served at our events for the past several years.

As we all know, no wine tasting is complete without the right appetizers. The Tetedemoin cheese, Bresola "Bündnerfleisch" and homemade "Chäschuechli" not only added to the Swiss-ness of the evening but were a perfect match for the delicious wines we had the opportunity to enjoy.

## AUSLÄNDER CORRESPONDENCE

We had planned on going on a two-day hiking trip over the weekend with some family to Zwingli-Hütte in Wildhaus, SG (I even made my travel buddy purchase hiking boots, although he insisted he wouldn't need them ). But alas, our adventure was scheduled on the same weekend that Fall decided to make its way into Switzerland and the hike was cancelled due to unfavorable weather.

We were left with two "Tageskarten" for Sunday which we purchased from our local Gemeinde and we decided to head south for a relaxing day trip in Wallis; Leukerbad to be exact.

Our train connections were smooth and while it was grey and chilly in Biel, the sun was making its way through the clouds on our way up to the largest thermal spa and wellness resort in the Alps (apparently a favourite vacationing spot of my grandparents).

The mountains in Switzerland never cease to amaze me. In any season, in any city, I am humbled by these towering peaks and have not yet decided if it's strange for me to feel a sense of protection when I see them all around me. At Leukerbad there is a toasty outdoor thermal pool in which we spent quite a bit of time wading around in silence. The outside air was cool and the fog was swirling around the top of the cliff that jutted out of the ground in the distance. "Bliss" doesn't even begin to cover it.

Of course, no pool experience is complete without trying out the water slides! As is usually the case, our ages changed from 24 and 30 to 12 and we found ourselves in line with the little ones, inner-tubes in hand and adrenaline pumping.


When I compare the experience to any of my other pool adventures in Washington, it seems as though this one was in a league of its own. Comparing it to Wild Waves seems grossly unjust! One thing I've come to notice is that while the Swiss are often known for working incredibly hard, they sure do know how to treat themselves to some rest and relaxation. Wellness spas can be found anywhere you go and it's certainly not uncommon to find them packed over the weekends. Fortunately, our change of plans occurred on a rather low-key day and we didn't feel crowded or overwhelmed as we splashed from pool to pool.

We also took some short dunks in the natural rock grotto – a little cave filled with skin-reddening- hot water and steam. This water travels along subterranean routes for more than forty years and becomes saturated with calcium and sulphate. As the water warms up it surfaces in numerous springs in Leukerbad. All natural, all Swiss – that's how we like it.
